Recognizing and supporting the diverse needs within the Philomath School District, equity is a critical lens for our planning and actions. Our schools are dedicated to placing students, families, and staff at the center of our considerations for the 2020-2021 school year. Philomath Middle School (PMS) has taken input from all staff as well as from focus group meetings (i.e. parents of students, Spanish family liaison, Special Education family representative, Site Council members, counselor, teachers, and administration), and Livestream school board meetings. Parents have participated in two district-wide surveys and two virtual 'Town Hall' meetings.

Based on recently-introduced Oregon metrics for re-opening, Philomath Middle School will begin the school year with students participating in short-term Comprehensive Distance Learning (CDL). This mode of instruction will continue through the first four weeks of the school year. At that time, the school will reevaluate metrics to determine if students will be able to return to school in a hybrid model, beginning on September 28, 2020. At the semester break (end of January 2021), PMS will evaluate current guidance and practice to determine whether additional students can be supported to physically attend school for the remainder of the school year. If major changes to guidance and practice, PMS stands ready to more quickly move to additional on-site learning or to comprehensive distance learning.

Philomath Middle School will offer access to four days of on-site learning for students from marginalized and/or underserved student populations. The current PMS student population is represented as follows:

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

At this time, visitors/volunteers will be unable to work in schools, or complete other volunteer activities that require in-person interaction. Adults in schools are limited to essential personnel only (including LBL, DHS, law enforcement, and delivery personnel, as needed).

1c. PHYSICAL DISTANCING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Establish a minimum of 35 square feet per person when determining room capacity. Calculate only with usable classroom space, understanding that desks and room set-up will require use of all space in the calculation. This also applies for professional development and staff gatherings.
- Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining at least six feet between individuals to the maximum extent possible.
- Minimize time standing in lines and take steps to ensure that six feet of distance between students is maintained, including marking spacing on floor, one-way traffic flow in constrained spaces, etc.
- Schedule modifications to limit the number of students in the building (e.g., rotating groups by days or location, staggered schedules to avoid hallway crowding and gathering).
- Plan for students who will need additional support in learning how to maintain physical distancing requirements. Provide instruction; don't employ punitive discipline.
- Staff should maintain physical distancing during all staff meetings and conferences, or consider remote web-based meetings.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

All classrooms/teaching spaces (including communal spaces, if they are used) will be evaluated to determine how many people can be accommodated allowing 35 square feet of usable space.

Relocate extra furniture to allow seating capacity for only the allowable number of people in each classroom.

Assign seating to maximize physical distancing and minimize physical interaction.

Remove / decommission fabric-covered furniture.

Where people will need to be in line, use floor markings to demonstrate where people should stand.

Mark travel lanes in hallways.

Monitors in each school to oversee compliance (through re-teaching, not discipline) with social distancing and support the process of maintaining contact-tracing logs.

Schedule modifications to limit the number of students in the school and classrooms (cohorting).

Stagger use of community spaces (cafeteria, gymnasium, playground)

Assigned entry points for each cohort will minimize the number of students at entrances and allow for supervision while students are physically distanced.

1d. COHORTING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Where feasible, establish stable cohorts: groups should be no larger than can be accommodated by the space available to provide 35 square feet per person, including staff.
 - The smaller the cohort, the less risk of spreading disease.
 As cohort groups increase in size, the risk of spreading disease increases.
- Students cannot be part of any single cohort, or part of multiple cohorts that exceed a total of 100 people within the educational week. Schools should plan to limit cohort sizes to allow for efficient contact-tracing and minimal risk for exposure.
- Each school must have a system for daily logs to ensure contract tracing among the cohort (see section 1a of the *Ready Schools*, *Safe Learners* guidance).
- Minimize interaction between students in different stable cohorts (e.g., access to restrooms, activities, common areas). Provide access to All Gender/Gender Neutral restrooms.
- Cleaning and wiping surfaces (e.g., desks, door handles, etc.) must be maintained between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.
- Design cohorts such that all students (including those protected under ADA and IDEA) maintain access to general education, grade level learning standards, and peers.
- Staff who interact with multiple stable cohorts must wash/sanitize their hands between interactions with different stable cohorts.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Contact tracing logs: Logs will be maintained for the school and all cohorts. Logs will be turned in to the school office at the end of each day. Logs will be sent to PSD Nurse for document maintenance.

Entrances/Exits, Meals: Student cohorts are assigned to specific entrances based on cohort.

Meals times shall be staggered to maintain cohorts.

Cleaning: See CD Management Plan

Staff Working with Multiple Cohorts: Staff members interacting with multiple cohorts shall wear masks and shall wash and/or sanitize hands between cohorts.

Transportation Cohort: Students will be assigned a transportation cohort.

Attendance on each bus shall be taken per route.

Maximum Cohort Assignment:

In most cases, students shall be assigned to one academic cohort and one transportation cohort.

Students participating in extra-curricular activities shall be assigned to a cohort.

1e. PUBLIC HEALTH COMMUNICATION

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Communicate to staff at the start of On-Site instruction and at periodic intervals explaining infection control measures that are being implemented to prevent spread of disease.
- Develop protocols for communicating with students, families and staff who have come into close contact with a confirmed case.
 - The definition of exposure is being within 6 feet of a COVID-19 case for 15 minutes (or longer).
- Develop protocols for communicating immediately with staff, families, and the community when a new case(s) of COVID-19 is diagnosed in students or staff members, including a description of how the school or district is responding.
- Provide all information in languages and formats accessible to the school community.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Communication will be shared with students, staff, and families at regular intervals to outline the following in their preferred language:

- Instructional model;
- Rationale for decision; and
- Specific infection control measures.

PSD District staff responsible for developing communication for students, staff, families and community at the following times:

- Family decisions about sending students to school;
- Sustained contact and/or confirmed case;
- Isolation and/or Exclusion;
- School or community outbreak; and

School closure and re-opening plans.

1f. ENTRY AND SCREENING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Direct students and staff to stay home if they, or anyone in their homes or community living spaces, have COVID-19 symptoms, or if anyone in their home or community living spaces has COVID-19. COVID-19 symptoms are as follows:
 - Primary symptoms of concern: cough, fever (of greater than 100.4°F) or chills, shortness of breath, or difficulty breathing.
 - Note that muscle pain, headache, sore throat, new loss of taste or smell, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, nasal congestion, and runny nose are also symptoms often associated with COVID-19. More information about COVID-19 symptoms is available from CDC.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

See Communicable Disease Management Plan.

OHA/ODE Requirements

- In addition to COVID-19 symptoms, students should be excluded from school for signs of other infectious diseases, per existing school policy and protocols. See pages 9-12 of <u>OHA/ODE Communicable Disease</u> <u>Guidance</u>.
- Emergency signs that require immediate medical attention:
 - Trouble breathing
 - Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
 - New confusion or inability to awaken
 - Bluish lips or face
 - Other severe symptoms
- Screen all students and staff for symptoms on entry to bus/school every day. This can be done visually and/or with confirmation from a parent/caregiver/guardian. Staff members can self-screen and attest to their own health.
 - Anyone displaying or reporting the primary symptoms of concern must be isolated (see section 1i of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance) and sent home as soon as possible.
 - They must remain home until 24 hours after fever is gone (without use of fever reducing medicine) and other symptoms are improving.
- Follow LPHA advice on restricting from school any student or staff known to have been exposed (e.g., by a household member) to COVID-19 within the preceding 14 calendar days.
- Staff or students with a chronic or baseline cough that has worsened or is not well-controlled with medication should be excluded from school. Do not exclude staff or students who have other symptoms that are chronic or baseline symptoms (e.g., asthma, allergies, etc.) from school.
- Hand hygiene on entry to school every day: wash with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Student Screening:

- Each cohort will be assigned a specific school entry location.
- Staff members will be assigned to each entry location to screen students prior to entry.
- When screening indicates symptoms, student will be directed to school office. Office staff will contact PSD Nurse and monitor isolation protocols.
- Hand washing and hand sanitizing stations will be strategically placed in school.
- For students arriving late to school, entry will be through the school office, utilizing appropriate protocols.

Staff Screening:

- Staff members are required to report when they have been exposed to COVID-19.
- Staff members are required to report when they have symptoms related to COVID-19.

Staff will go through screening protocol at the beginning of each school day.

1g. VISITORS/VOLUNTEERS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- □ Restrict non-essential visitors/volunteers.
- Visitors/volunteers must wash or sanitize their hands upon entry and exit.
- Visitors/volunteers must maintain six-foot distancing, wear face coverings, and adhere to all other provisions of this guidance.
- Screen all visitors/volunteers for symptoms upon every entry. Restrict from school property any visitor known to have been exposed to COVID-19 within the preceding 14 calendar days.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

At this time, visitors and volunteers will be unable to work in schools or complete other activities that require in-person interaction with students. Adults in the school are limited to essential personnel only. (Includes LBL, DHS, law enforcement, emergency personnel, mental health support, and/or delivery personnel as might be needed.

1h. FACE COVERINGS, FACE SHIELDS, AND CLEAR PLASTIC BARRIERS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Face coverings or face shields for all students in grades Kindergarten and up following CDC guidelines Face Coverings.
- If a student removes a face covering, or demonstrates a need to remove the face covering for a short-period of time, the school/team must:
- □ Face masks for school RNs or other medical personnel when
 providing direct contact care and monitoring of staff/students
 displaying symptoms. School nurses should also wear appropriate
 Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for their role.

Protections under the ADA or IDEA

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Required PPE will be provided for all school staff members and other essential adults.

Required PPE will be available for students as might be needed.

Face coverings cannot be required for use by students with:

- Medical conditions that make it difficult to breathe with face covering;
- An identified disability that prevent the use of a face covering.

Removal of face covering by student should never prohibit or prevent access to instruction or activities.

OHA/ODE Requirements Hybrid/Onsite Plan If any student requires an accommodation to meet the requirement for face coverings, districts and schools should work to limit the student's proximity to students and staff to the extent possible to minimize the possibility of exposure. Appropriate accommodations could include:

- Offering different types of face coverings and face shields that may meet the needs of the student.
- Spaces away from peers while the face covering is removed; students should not be left alone or unsupervised.
- Short periods of the educational day that do not include wearing the face covering, while following the other health strategies to reduce the spread of disease;
- Additional instructional supports to effectively wear a face covering;
- For students with existing medical conditions, doctor's orders to not wear face coverings, or other health related concerns, schools/districts must not deny access to On-Site instruction.
- Schools and districts must comply with the established IEP/504 plan prior to the closure of in-person instruction in March of 2020.
 - If a student eligible for, or receiving services under a 504/IEP, cannot wear a face covering due to the nature of the disability, the school or district must:
 - Review the 504/IEP to ensure access to instruction in a manner comparable to what was originally established in the student's plan including on-site instruction with accommodations or adjustments.
 - Placement determinations cannot be made due solely to the inability to wear a face covering.
 - Plans should include updates to accommodations and modifications to support students.
 - Students protected under ADA/IDEA, who abstain from wearing a face covering, or students whose families determine the student will not wear a face covering, the school or district must:
 - Review the 504/IEP to ensure access to instruction in a manner comparable to what was originally established in the student's plan.
 - 2. The team must determine that the disability is not prohibiting the student from meeting the requirement.

1i. ISOLATION MEASURES

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Protocols for exclusion and isolation for sick students and staff whether identified at the time of bus pick-up, arrival to school, or at any time during the school day.
- Protocols for screening students, as well as exclusion and isolation protocols for sick students and staff identified at the time of arrival or during the school day.
 - Work with school nurses, health care providers, or other staff with expertise to determine necessary modifications to areas where staff/students will be isolated.
 - Consider required physical arrangements to reduce risk of disease transmission.
 - Plan for the needs of generally well students who need medication or routine treatment, as well as students who may show signs of illness.
- ☑ Students and staff who report or develop symptoms must be isolated in a designated isolation area in the school, with adequate space and staff supervision and symptom monitoring by a school nurse, other school-based health care provider or school staff until they are able to go home. Anyone providing supervision and symptom monitoring must wear appropriate face covering or face shields.
 - School nurse and health staff in close contact with symptomatic individuals (less than six feet) should wear a medical-grade face mask. Other Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) may be needed depending on symptoms and care provided. Consult a nurse or health care professional regarding appropriate use of PPE. Any PPE used during care of a symptomatic individual should be properly removed and disposed of prior to exiting the care space.
 - After removing PPE, hands should be immediately cleaned with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, hands can be cleaned with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains 60-95% alcohol.
 - If able to do so safely, a symptomatic individual should wear a face covering.
 - To reduce fear, anxiety, or shame related to isolation, provide a clear explanation of procedures, including use of PPE and handwashing.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

School Bus:

Students developing symptoms on the bus shall be seated in a designated location and taken to the school office immediately upon arrival to school. Students displaying symptoms upon screening will be sent to the supervised isolation area until able to go home.

School Arrival:

Students and staff will be screened upon arrival to school. Students exhibiting symptoms upon arrival will be sent to the supervised isolation area until able to go home.

During School Day:

Students and staff exhibiting symptoms shall be sent to the front office for screening and placement in isolation room.

Positive COVID-19 Test:

Students or staff who have tested positive for COVID-19 will quarantine at home. The person should remain at home for at least ten days after illness onset and 72 hours after fever is gone, without use of fever-reducing medication, and other symptoms are improving.

Updated protocol from the Oregon Health Authority and the Oregon Department of education guidance will direct any changes to this criteria.

Communication Protocol:

Contact PSD District Nurse whenever an individual is isolated with symptoms.

- Ensure accurate sign-in/sign-out protocols to help facilitate contact tracing by the LPHA. Sign-in procedures are not a replacement for entrance and screening requirements. Students entering school after arrival times must be screened for the primary symptoms of concern.
 - Eliminate shared pen and paper sign-in/sign-out sheets.
 - Ensure hand sanitizer is available if signing children in or out on an electronic device.
- Ensure hand sanitizer dispensers are easily accessible near all entry doors and other high-traffic areas. Establish and clearly communicate procedures for keeping caregiver drop-off/pick-up as brief as possible.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Students will have designated drop-off and pick-up locations based on cohort and grade level.

Each teacher will follow protocol to help facilitate contact tracing.

Staff will complete information, not allowing a shared pen/paper.

2f. CLASSROOMS/REPURPOSED LEARNING SPACES

- Seating: Rearrange student desks and other seat spaces so that staff and students' physical bodies are six feet apart to the maximum extent possible while also maintaining 35 square feet per person; assign seating so students are in the same seat at all times.
- Materials: Avoid sharing of community supplies when possible (e.g., scissors, pencils, etc.). Clean these items frequently. Provide hand sanitizer and tissues for use by students and staff.
- ☑ Handwashing: Remind students (with signage and regular verbal reminders from staff) of the utmost importance of hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette. Respiratory etiquette means covering coughs and sneezes with an elbow or a tissue. Tissues should be disposed of in a garbage can, then hands washed or sanitized immediately.
 - Wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

- **Seating:** Classroom desks and tables will be arranged allowing students to maintain 35 sq. feet of space and maintain 6' of distance. Students will have assigned seats.
- Materials: Each classroom will limit sharing of community supplies when possible (e.g., scissors, pencils, etc.). If needed to share, these items will be cleaned between each use. Hand sanitizer and tissues will be available for use by students and staff.
- Handwashing: All students will be regularly reminded to wash their hands. Hand washing opportunities will be provided throughout the school day. Signage at each sink/hand washing station will remind students and staff of effective handwashing practices.
- Environment: Ventilation is being addressed in every building.
 Open windows, fans, supplemental ventilation tools outdoor spaces will be used when appropriate.

2g. PLAYGROUNDS, FIELDS, RECESS, BREAKS, AND RESTROOMS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Keep school playgrounds closed to the general public until park playground equipment and benches reopen in the community (see Oregon Health Authority's <u>Specific Guidance for Outdoor</u> <u>Recreation Organizations</u>).
- After using the restroom students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds. Soap must be made available to students and staff.
- Before and after using playground equipment, students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds <u>or</u> use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.
- Designate playground and shared equipment solely for the use of one cohort at a time. Disinfect at least daily or between use as much as possible in accordance with <u>CDC guidance</u>.
- Cleaning requirements must be maintained (see section 2j of the Ready Schools, Safe Learners guidance).
- Maintain physical distancing requirements, stable cohorts, and square footage requirements.
- Provide signage and restrict access to outdoor equipment (including sports equipment, etc.).
- Design recess activities that allow for physical distancing and maintenance of stable cohorts.
- Limit staff rooms, common staff lunch areas, and workspaces to single person usage at a time, maintaining six feet of distance between adults.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Playgrounds shall remain closed to the public.

Student break activities will be supervised in a manner conducive to appropriate social distancing.

Students will take breaks only with assigned cohort.

Students will be reminded of hand-cleansing requirements before and after breaks.

Shared equipment will be cleaned between cohorts.

2h. MEAL SERVICE/NUTRITION

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☐ Include meal services/nutrition staff in planning for school reentry.
- Staff serving meals must wear face shields or face covering (see section 1h of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).

2j. CLEANING, DISINFECTION, AND VENTILATION

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Clean, sanitize, and disinfect frequently touched surfaces (e.g., playground equipment, door handles, sink handles, drinking fountains, transport vehicles) and shared objects (e.g., toys, games, art supplies) between uses multiple times per day. Maintain clean and disinfected (CDC guidance) environments, including classrooms, cafeteria settings and restrooms.
- Clean and disinfect playground equipment at least daily or between use as much as possible in accordance with <u>CDC</u> guidance.
- Apply disinfectants safely and correctly following labeling direction as specified by the manufacturer. Keep these products away from students.
- ☑ To reduce the risk of asthma, choose disinfectant products on the EPA List N with asthma-safer ingredients (e.g. hydrogen peroxide, citric acid, or lactic acid) and avoid products that mix these with asthma-causing ingredients like peroxyacetic acid, sodium hypochlorite (bleach), or quaternary ammonium compounds.
- Operate ventilation systems properly and/or increase circulation of outdoor air as much as possible by opening windows and doors, using fans, and through other methods. Consider running ventilation systems continuously and changing the filters more frequently. Do <u>not</u> use fans if they pose a safety or health risk, such as increasing exposure to pollen/allergies or exacerbating asthma symptoms. For example, do not use fans if doors and windows are closed and the fans are recirculating the classroom air.
- Consider the need for increased ventilation in areas where students with special health care needs receive medication or treatments.
- Facilities should be cleaned and disinfected at least daily to prevent transmission of the virus from surfaces (see <u>CDC's</u> <u>guidance on disinfecting public spaces</u>).
- Air circulation and filtration are helpful factors in reducing airborne viruses. Consider modification or enhancement of building ventilation where feasible (see <u>CDC's guidance on ventilation and filtration</u> and <u>American Society of Heating, Refrigerating, and Air-Conditioning Engineers' guidance</u>).

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Comprehensive Distance Learning (CDL) will remain in place during any time of school closure due to COVID-19, unless staffing levels are insufficient to support this model.
