FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

Philomath High School (PHS) is dedicated to supporting outstanding student achievement, and successful transition for every student as they enter higher education or a career pathway. We use a variety of regularly scheduled assessments (local, State and National) to measure student learning and identify instructional strategies that support our learning community and individual learners. The Oregon School Report Card provides one snapshot of information that we consider in our decision-making. PHS is proud of student and staff achievements as represented on the 2016-2017 report card. There was significant overall achievement growth in Math and Science, and English Language Arts demonstrated continued strong success. In all three content areas PHS performance was higher than statewide and comparator school averages. We did not quite reach the target for required participation. Families have the choice to opt out of the assessments, and last year our participation rate on two of the content areas fell just below 95%. We do encourage participation on these assessments; they help our school and our school district measure student

academic growth. Our graduation rate dropped slightly from the previous year, but is still higher than statewide and comparator school averages. The PHS 96% completer rate indicates that we are successfully meeting the needs of standard diploma seeking students as well as those who are on an alternative path (GED, modified diploma, etc.) PHS is committed to equitable support for all students, and is using this report card as an opportunity to help identify areas for targeted improvement. As Philomath High School strengthens academic and extracurricular programming, we pay close attention to assisting subgroups, emerging bilingual children and those with disabilities. We encourage our families to contribute input on our progress, goals and strategies through our PHS Site Council, PSD Emerging Bilingual Advisory Committee, and our PSD Special Education Advisory Committee. With students, staff, families, and the community working together, we will secure high levels of achievement for all.

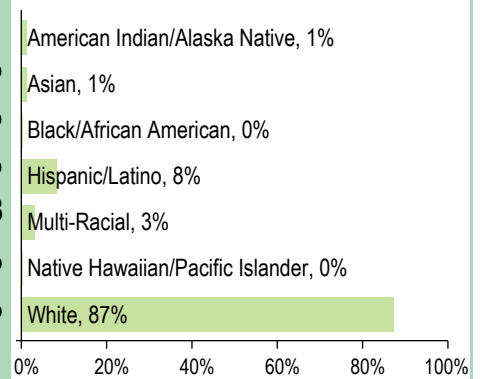
